During this trip several individuals come to me with notes written by their doctor indicating medicine needed for a family member, in most cases, a child. All of the prescriptions were, with one exception, less than \$5.00. Money is not there for anything including medicine. Another person, a housekeeper at the university, showed me the heels on her shoes which were just about to fall off. She, likewise, had no money to get them repaired. How can one not assist? 90% of the population are in this situation. Approximately \$1300.00 in goods and \$3600.00 in funds were dispersed during this journey.


This years journey to NI went very smooth as compared with last year's challenges. Thanks to all who assisted in making this trip productive and rewarding.

The focus this year were on Medical Supplies and Medicine. In addition, other items such as Computer Software/Hardware, Hand-Tools and Educational Material were included.

I visited two schools that had received supplies which were shipped to NI last year. The Administrators at both schools were eager to show me what they had received and hoped that they could get more in the future.

The Medical Items and Medicine were given to a Hospital in Diriamba and an Old Peoples Home in Masaya. Twenty-four residents live at the home. The Nicaraguan government pays the home \$350.00 per month to cover all expenses. This equates to \$0.48 per day per resident. The administrator said to me: "I do not know how we make it from month-tomonth", somehow they do.
